# CLASS OF 2024: IN COMPARISON

## FULL-TIME EMPLOYMENT

UMW graduates in the class of 2024 had a **higher full-time employment rate (54%)** than class of 2024 graduates at comparable bachelor's degree institutions, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) First Destination Survey:

- Institutions in the Southeast (47%)
- Institutions in the Mid-Atlantic (49%)
- Overall bachelor's institutions (51%)
- Baccalaureate Arts & Sciences (Carnegie Classification) (51%)
